

Risk Assessment: Covid Update - 17th January 2022

This Risk Assessment has considered the government guidance provided on 17th January and takes further consideration as new guidelines are provided by Public Health and the NYA information provided on 17th January. The risk assessment is for all operations as of 17th January 2022.

Providing first aid	Young people and staff	Qualified first aiders administer first aid. All first aid is recorded and accessible to parents/carers on collection. Maintain effective housekeeping through good practice. This will include, maintaining the building maintenance inline with existing policies, health and safety procedures, and risk assessments attached to different activities. Ensure the accident book is kept up to date and RIDDOR accidents are reported as per regulations.	Masks should be worn by both parties in the event of providing first aid. This does not apply for anyone under the age of 11 PPE to be worn if required where there may be a risk of contact with bodily fluids - PPE includes gloves, mask, apron and eye protection. Gloves should be worn during any first aid, even for minor injuries. To avoid mouth-to-mouth CPR. Minor first aid incidents including bumps/scrapes will not require any additional PPE than would normally be worn.	 First aid books and/or tablets are accessible throughout. Sufficient PPE and first aid equipment across all sites.
